Poetry has musical elements – it often has a rhythm and pattern in how it's written and how it flows when we read a poem.

This poem mentions five different types of musical instruments – do you play an instrument? Which one? If you don't play an instrument, which is your favourite and why?

But this doesn't seem to be about playing the instruments or the sounds they make. Hmm, what's Kate up to? Let's find out!

Kate starts by telling us that there is plenty we can do with musical instruments if we "listen hard enough". OK, let's listen...

- 1. What does she say we can do with a xylophone?
- 2. What can you catch with a clarinet
 - a bus?
 - a cold?
 - a fish
- 3. What's a trombone good for?
- 4. What can an electric guitar be useful for?
- 5. When might her trumpet be useful to you?
- 6. Did you listen "hard enough" to Kate's words? There is a lot of playfulness in Kate's poems she enjoys playing with language and words, and this poem is a good example. It's a good example of "word play" taking apart a word to find smaller words that could be used to mean something very different.

Underline each instrument in the poem. What part of the word is she playing with?

7. Now **try writing your own poem** by playing with language and words like Kate Wakeling has. It is spring time and there is a lot around us to make use of. There are three lists below – choose either fruits, insects or flowers and create a fun poem about Spring – are there any words inside these words you can play with? Or can you use another meaning of a word that sounds the same (homophones like 'pear/pair').
